Wolfsangel (Ulvefellen)

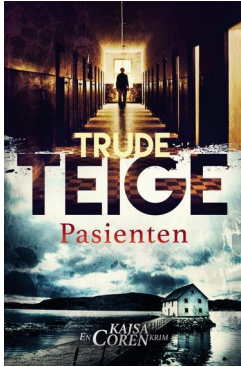
Thriller | Aschehoug | 2017 | 350 pages

An extraordinary thriller about a man determined to change the course of the second world war. A disillusioned and regretting veteran injured on the Eastern front, Norwegian Henry Storm is the unlikeliest of heroes. Getting to know secret about a German "wonder weapon", he decides to go back to Germany, to uncover the mystery, and redeem himself.

Werner Sorge is an officer in the German security service whose investigations cross paths with the secret rocket program and Storm. To find the Norwegian spy he employs his own secret weapon: A beautiful and troubled Polish woman turned into a German agent.

Can Storm get his game-changing intel out of the Reich? Will Sorge bait him into the Wolfsangel trap?

Would you let someone die if you could save ten others? What if it was your son or daughter? Croesus has been a patient at a mental institution for 50 years. Before he dies, he whispers: – they kill patients here.

One of the few who managed to talk to Croesus, is Julia, the daughter of a brain surgeon who works at the institution.

Some years later Julia disappears without a trace, and when journalist Kajsa Coren is summoned to find out what happened, she is thrown into a maelstrom that includes psychiatric research, an undiscovered Edvard Munch-painting and neglected children.

Soon Kajsa's employer is found murdered.

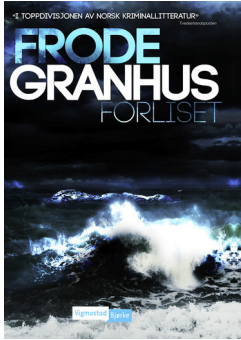

Eclipse in May (Eclipse i mai)

Eclipse in May is Nygårdshaug at his best; entertaining, thrilling and significant. Gudolv Gudvolden is apparently living a quiet life on the country side in Norway, working as a translator of European, classical literature. Nobody suspect he is a hit man. Gudolv is traveling to Germany to finish his mission number eight- out of ten, which is when he has decided to quit, and enjoy a normal life. Haydir is a Turkish mathematician. He involuntarily serves time in the army. To avoid a homicide planned by his sadistic commander, he warns a village with only women, children and elders about a planned ambush by his troop. In *Eclipse in May* Nygårdshaug creates two distinct worlds with protagonists from two completely different cultures - Norway and Turkey. Both have a troubled background. Through coincidences and a game, where people with power, positions, money and influence govern the world, they meet. The novel is built up as a thriller, keeping the reader on the edge until the last page. Simultaneously, it raises the question about what is justice- and who can decide what is right and wrong?

A young boy walks out on thin ice to save his new ski. Years later, a red winter jacket is found under the floor of an old house about to be renovated. Four women try to cope with their drug addiction in a tiny town far out by the rough ocean. A photographer finds a barrel frozen in the ice containing a horrible truth.

Shipwrecked is the fifth book in the series about Rino Carlsen, where the icy cold landscape of Lofoten and the unpredictable weather act as characters in the story that continuously take the reader and the police by surprise.
