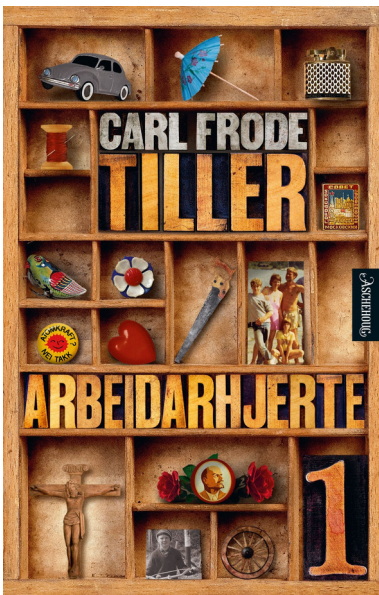
Trond got what he wanted.

He grew up in a rural working-class environment in the 1970s and 1980s, his father a sawmill worker and card-carrying communist, his mother a nursing assistant who broke with her puritan Christian family. But Trond had higher ambitions. He studied at university, married the bourgeois Therese and eased into a middle-class life. He got just what he wanted – but now he has lost it. He has lost his job, divorced his wife, and he doesn't understand his daughters. He is at constant war with both his surroundings and himself.

Elegantly shifting between Trond's present and past, *A Worker's Heart* is a novel about the great social and political changes of the past decades. But it's also a story about the impact that these greater changes have on our most intimate relationships, about rage and desperation, about love and longing.

This is the first book of a two-volume work. The second book is scheduled for publication autumn 2025.

Doubtless one of his generation's most important novelists, Carl Frode Tiller (b 1970) is admired for his instantly recognizable, furious prose and his ability to create vivid, complex characters. Tiller succeeds in portraying these tragic characters in a way that arouses the deepest sympathy in the reader.

In 2005 he was named one of the 10 best Norwegian writers under 35. In 2006, *The Slope* was named among the 25 most important Norwegian novels from the last 25 years in a prestigious contest in the daily Dagbladet. In 2018, LA Review of Books characterized his latest US publication *Encircling 2* as an "incomparable intellectual escarpade".

In addition to his novels, Tiller has written several plays, short stories and short prose for various magazines and newspapers.

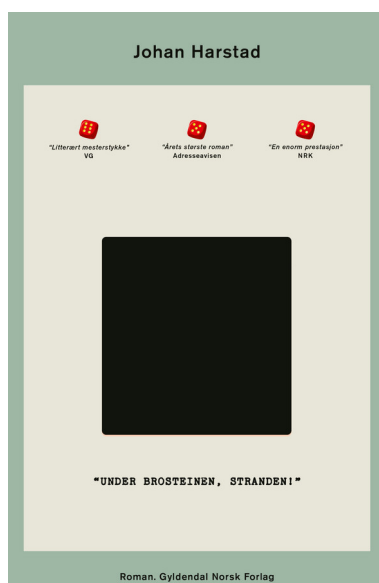
Under the Paving-Stones, the Beach!

Under the Paving-Stones, the Beach! is a novel about the discovery of a paving-stone shaped object which, when touched, allegedly creates the illusion of having lived an entire lifespan within seven minutes. Centered around a group of teens in late-nineties Stavanger, but containing numerous historical and geographical detours to places like The Soviet Union, Berlin, Warszawa, Akureyri, Shanghai and not least the island Tristan da Cunha in the sixties, and populated by everything from suburban youth on the hunt for the next industrial exhaust fan to warm up by in the evenings to Cold War spies with multiple sets of faltering loyalties, Zapatistas on a local level and pot wholesalers of dubious mental caliber, young people in love and amateur radio dads who are all widowers, old-school sailors and new-school sailors, Icelandic Eco-Terrorists, suicidal single moms and self-crossing clinical directors, some who are psychiatric patients and some who probably should've been, an adventurous meteorologist from Forus, Stavanger and an astrophysicist with an urgent need to explain himself about non-academical topics, and guest starring people like Andrej Tarkovsky and Erich Mielke, the novel explores the idea that time might never really have been on our side after all.

This is a large-scale story about waiting; for life to begin, for things to pass, waiting for the right one, waiting for death and waiting in vain. It is the novel about Ingmar, Jonatan and Peter. And Ebba.

Johan Harstad (b. 1979) offers a wholly original voice and is one of the most obvious talents published by Gyldendal for many years. He sees human fates in modern reality in a way that is both urgent and refined, offering a complete involvement and a particular sense of absurd humor. His characters often stand slightly to one side, at a distance to the major pulse of society. They are vulnerable, lonely, different.

Johan Harstad made his debut 21 years old, with a contribution to *Postboks 6860* in 2000, releasing his first collection of prose works, *From here on you just get older*, in 2001. In addition to his critically acclaimed novels, Harstad has also written four pieces for the theatre, collected in *BSIDES* published in 2008.

Kathrine Nedrejord (b.1987) is an author of both adult fiction, books for children/YA and theatre plays. She made her debut in 2010 with the novel *Transit*, which received glowing reviews. In 2019 her acclaimed novel *Transformation* was awarded the Havmann Prize. Its follow-up, *Criminal and Punishment*, was nominated for the Nordic Council Literature Prize 2023. Her books for children and young adults have earned several nominations for prestigious literary awards, among them the IBBY Honor list and two-time nominated for the Ministry of Culture's Literary Prize. The German edition of the YA *Sara's Secret* was awarded Book of the Month. Nedrejord was recently the house dramatist at the National Theatre in Oslo. She lives in France.

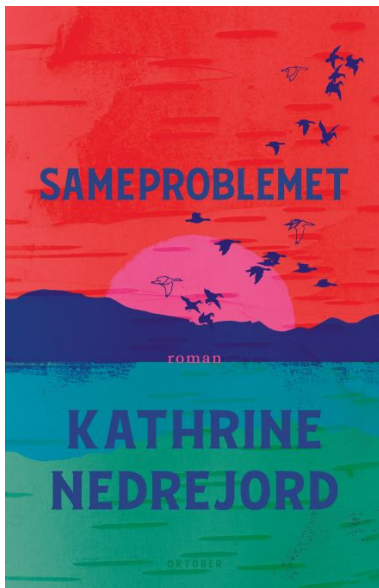
Marie has just become a mother for the first time. She lives in France, far away from her roots. When her áhkku – her mother's mother – dies, she travels alone home to Finnmark, Norway's northernmost county, to attend the funeral.

On her way back to her hometown, she decides to write áhkku's story. It quickly turns into a story about the women in her family, about how oppression has marked the lives of her great-grandmother, her grandmother, her mother and herself, and about how her Sami background has shaped her worldview.

The Sami Problem is an investigation into what it means to be a Sami, a woman, a mother, daughter and granddaughter. It is a powerful novel about Sami culture, language and identity, and a both furious and clear-eyed reckoning with oppression, discrimination and bigotry towards one of Europe's major indigenous peoples.

Kyrre Andreassen (b. 1971) debuted in 1997 with the short story collection *This Is Where You Have Your Friends*. Andreassen has an MA from the University of Oslo. In 2006, his novel *Svendsen's Catering* earned him the Linguistic Society's Literature Prize (Språklig samlings litteraturpris), and in 2007, he received the Hunger Prize (Sultprisen) for his authorship. His novel *Furthermore, I Believe Carthage Must be Destroyed* (2016) was also nominated for the Brage Prize.

In The House of Pantaloon is a novel about the destructive power of shame and how the silence that follows in its wake can ripple through generations.

The novel is set in Oslo, over the course of a few months. We follow Eva and Cornelia in alternate chapters, as Eva is dealing with widowhood, and Cornelia with a broken relationship and single parenthood. Through chance, Eva and Cornelia's paths keep crossing. A tender and unexpected affinity develops between the two women, who at first seem to have little in common, and who find themselves in vastly different circumstances.

The story has a plot-driven narrative, with an existential nerve, slight satirical elements, and much warmth. By the end, the reader will realize how these two women's lives are intertwined through secrets of the past and "the sins of the fathers", with Henrik Ibsen's *Ghosts* as a hinted-at backdrop.

Hilde Rød-Larsen (b. 1974) made her literary debut in 2019 with the novel *Summer Time*, and in 2022 *Diamond nights* came out to critical acclaim in Norway, Denmark and Germany. In 2023 she was awarded the Bookseller's Author Stipend for her authorship. Hilde Rød-Larsen is also known as the Norwegian translator of authors such as Thomas Kørsgaard, Elizabeth Strout and Sally Rooney. *In the House of Pantaloon*, the first book in a planned trilogy, came out in 2024. Rød-Larsen has a Bachelor and a Master's Degree from The London School of Economics and lives in Oslo.

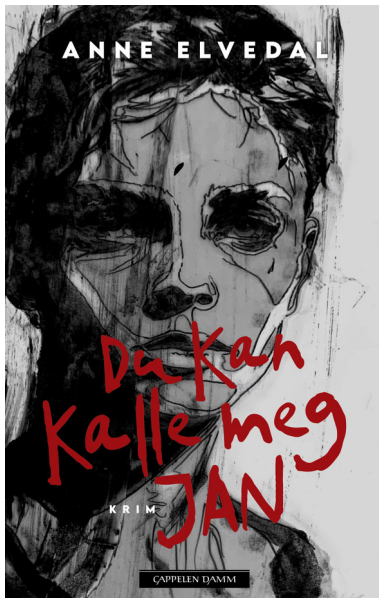
