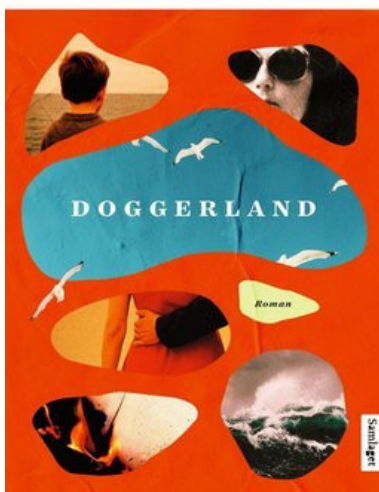

Drought Summer is Steinar Opstad's first novel.

It tells the story of twelve-year-old Snorre Buvin, who lives through a dramatic summer, both in wardly and outwardly. The village of Vestre Spån is suffering from drought, and his father, along with the other farmers, fears the consequences. Snorre's mother becomes mentally ill and is eventually hospitalized. The neighboring farmer Rollev becomes important to Snorre, until something happens between them that should never have happened. Snorre feels different. At times, he does not know whether he is a boy, a girl, or an elf.

Drought Summer is written in a vivid, poetic language that cultivates a distinctly literary orality.

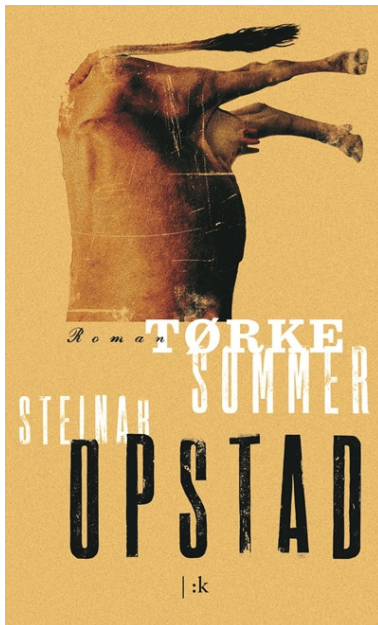

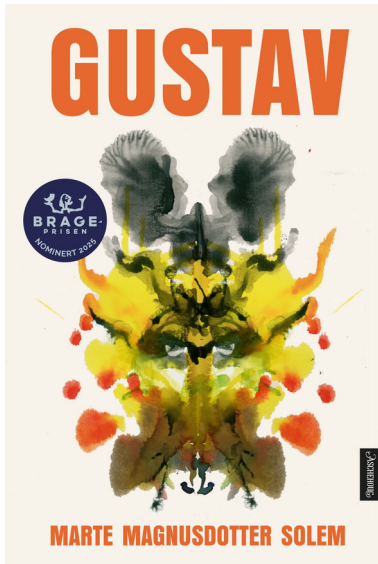

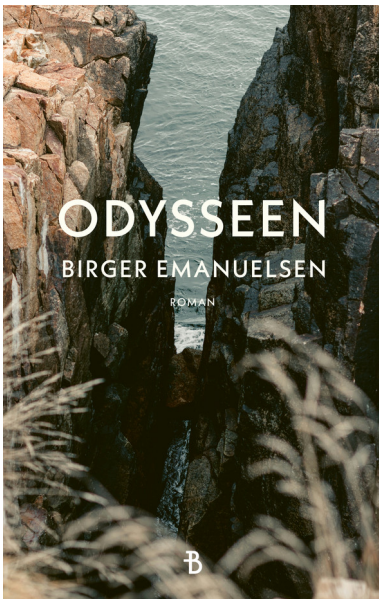

When a father slips into dementia, his son takes him to the family cabin on the far edge of the sea – a small, weather-beaten place holding the last traces of a life long gone. This is where the father once wished to go when the diagnosis came. And this is where the son believes he might still catch a final glimpse of the man who raised him. No one around them thinks that the trip is a good idea. But a promise is a promise, and each night, they read Homer's *Odyssey* aloud, the ancient tale echoing their own muted search. The Odyssey is a tender, unsentimental portrait of dignity at the end of life, and of a son stepping into the role of parent to his own father. A quiet, deeply resonant novel about the slow unravelling of memory, the weight of promises and the fragile bond that remains when everything else begins to fall away.

Since then, he has published a number of critically acclaimed novels, essays and the non-fiction book *Før de forsvinner* (2024). He has previously received the Sørlandet Literature Prize and the Youth Critics' Prize, and *The Odyssey* has won the prestigious Riksmål Society Literature Prize and is once again nominated for the Sørlandet Literature Prize.

Kitchen is a warm, wistful and piercing novel about the Minde family in Vika in the 1970s – a district where Oslo's slums are still close to everyday life. When her son Kaj moves out, Gerd Minde is left in a home where silence reveals more than words ever did. Lars Saabye Christensen (b. 1953) is one of Norway's most beloved and prolific authors. Despite being best known for his long novels, Saabye is also a poet. His debut book was the poetry collection *History of Gly* (1976), for which he was awarded the Tarjei Vesaas prize. His first novel, *The Amateur*, was published in 1977 and Saabye Christensen often says all his novels could've had this title. Humans who struggle with inner insecurities and lack of a directory of their own lives, who are not professionally well-prepared in all of life's situations, but instead make wrong choices and appear clumsy – these are the people he has an ever-recurring love for in his books.

His big breakthrough novel was *Beatles* (1984), which is one of the biggest selling literary titles in Norway ever and which new generations of youth keep falling in love with. In 2001 his epic major work *The Half Brother* was published, an extraordinarily generous and moving novel, which follows a family over a period of many years and through all stages of life. *The Half Brother* became an international success and won the Nordic Council Literature Prize. Between 2017 and 2021 the series *Echoes of the City* was published, which was met with exceptional review and reached a large readership. Saabye Christensen has written over 70 titles, won numerous prizes and awards, and has been translated into 36 languages.

In the summer of 1030, the Viking king Olav Haraldsson was killed in the Battle of Stiklestad, during a failed attempt to recapture his kingdom. Among those fighting on the losing side was Olav's fifteen-year-old half-brother, Harald Sigurdsson. Badly wounded, he fled the battlefield - and Norway.

For the next two decades he attempted to build a great kingdom consisting of present-day Norway, Denmark and England. He almost succeeded.

Tore Skeie tells the story of Harald Hardrada as it has never been told before. Through a deep dive into sources from many countries and kingdoms, Harald's life story is contextualized within a broad representation of the world he lived in. 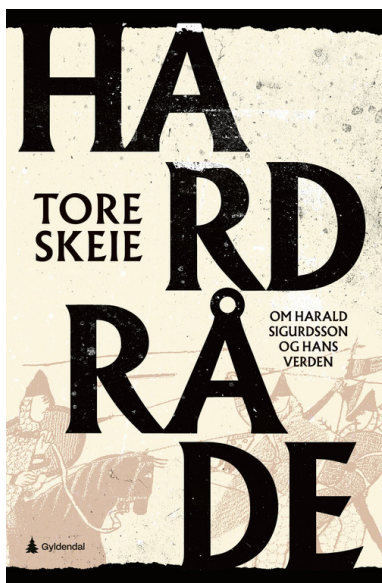

Ann-Marie de Lange is a neuroscientist and clinical psychologist specialising in population neuroscience and applied machine learning. With over ten years of research experience from the University of Oslo, the University of Oxford in the UK, and Lausanne University Hospital in Switzerland, she has a solid and internationally recognized academic background. As head of the research group 'FemiLab', she focuses on how biological, genetic, and environmental factors influence women's brain health throughout life. De Lange has published a number of influential articles and secured funding from research councils both in Norway and Europe. She has also worked actively to make research results available to a wider audience through podcasts, participation in a BBC documentary, and popular science talks such as TEDx.

Is it possible to get someone who believes in conspiracy theories back to their family and reality?

Author Christine Rehn Jensen tries to find out how a completely ordinary person can suddenly start believing in extraordinary explanations. What social, psychological and cultural forces drive such processes, and how does it affect families and communities? It is November in the olive grove in Neo Chorio on Crete, and the harvest is a struggle from morning to night. Author Stian Bromark was so fascinated by olive trees and the process of making oil that he bought his own grove. But this year's harvest was the worst in many years – what was the reason?

Olives and olive oil have been a driving force in the development of civilization and culture for many thousands of years, and have been used for food, heating, light and perfume. A full 80 percent of the production of table olives and oil in the world takes place around the Mediterranean. The very best oil is considered by many to be almost a medical supplement, and the Mediterranean diet has been voted the healthiest in the world.

But now climate change threatens, and Bromark meets farmers and producers who say that this is affecting how food is produced and consumed. He himself buys more trees to have enough olives to make oil. The book is a personal narrative that brilliantly combines history and geography, food and health, politics and climate – in a vivid reportage from Europe's food plate.

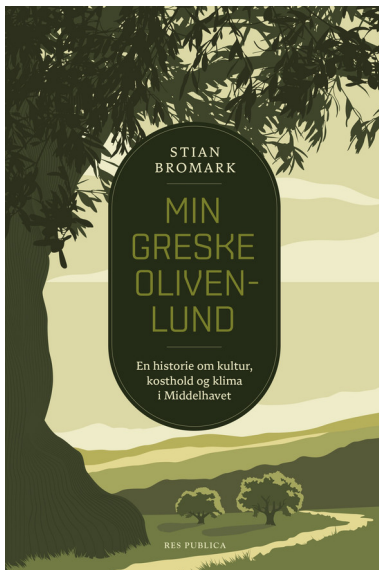
