Can you forgive yourself for the pain you inflict on others?

Almost-sixty-one-year-old anesthesiologist Carla Ruud drives from Oslo to her hometown to visit her mother at the nursing home. With her in the car is a young woman, Synne, who is heading in the same direction. On the icy road, Carla loses control of the car and they end up driving off a cliff. Despite all her medical experience, Carla cannot save Synne's life.

Breathe for Me is a pensive novel from the author of the best-seller *Mother's Gifts*. A novel about three generations of women - Carla's mother aged 90, Carla herself, and Carla's daughter, Ingrid aged 31 - about the vulnerability of being dependent on those closest to you and about losing control over your own life. One can withstand pain as long as it has a purpose, but what about when it does not have any? And the day you no longer feel like anybody needs you, who are you then?

Cecilie Enger was born in 1963, and has studied history, Norwegian and journalism. She also works as a feature journalist when she is not writing critically-acclaimed novels. Her first novel *Necessity* was published in 1994 and was warmly received by critics. Her big break came with *Mother's Gifts* in 2013, which sold internationally and earned her the Booksellers' Prize that year. She is perhaps best known for biographical and historically-inspired novels as well as strong portraits of female characters.

Fanny is a young orphaned girl who tries to live as best as she can, alone on the outskirts of a small town. The days go by performing simple chores: getting to school, repairing the gutter, chopping wood and keeping the weeds at bay. But beyond these sorry conditions, there is the fairy tale, full of stubborn conceptions and possibilities. Through Fanny's distinct approach to the world, this seemingly simple story becomes a simile about friendship, independence and transgression.

Fanny and the Mystery in the Grieving Forest is a both hopeful and deeply disturbing novel.

Rune Christiansen became an important figure in the Norwegian literary landscape already with the publication of his first book, the poetry collection *Where the Train Leaves the Sea*, in 1986. Though he was initially known as a groundbreaking poet, Christiansen has increasingly turned his attention to prose, having published a string of acclaimed novels since 2003: *Intimacy* (2003), *The Absence of Music* (2007), *Chrysanthemum* (2009) and *The Loneliness in Lydia Erneman's Life* (2014). Hailed by many critics as his best work so far, the latter won the national book award, the Brage, and was shortlisted for both the Critics' Prize for fiction, the Young Readers' Critics' Prize and the P2 Listeners' Novel Prize. Christiansen has also translated poets such as Frank Kuppner, Alain Bosquet and Edmond Jabés, and edits a select series of contemporary poetry in translation for his publisher, Forlaget Oktober.

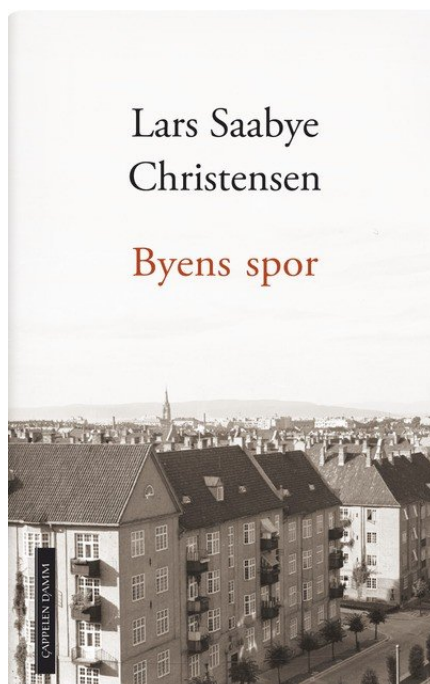

We've all stood on a street corner and let the city's lights and sounds pass by. What do we hear when we listen to the sounds of the city? What traces do they leave in us? Who is at the other end of the line when the phone rings? What story can we deduce from the protocols from Fagerborg's branch of the Red Cross in the post-war years? How do the stories all connect? When someone loses something, someone else finds something different. The city and the streets are the same as before, but the people who emerge in *Traces of the City* (*Byens spor*) have never been seen before.

At the center are Ewald and Maj Kristoffersen, but their fates are closely interwoven with the city and the streets they live on: At Bristol (where Ewald spends a lot of time with his colleagues), the pianist Enzo Borso plays, while above them lives the widow Mrs. Vik. Down the road a couple has a butcher shop. They have a son, Jostein, who goes deaf after a traffic accident. Jesper, Ewald and Maj's son, promises to be his ears in the world. The butcher couple and Mrs. Vik have a telephone, but not the Kristoffersen family. Maj is a treasurer for the Red Cross, where the female leaders are married to the doctor who declares Jesper to be too sensitive. Jesper takes piano lessons from Erzo Bonso, Mrs. Vik meets the widower Olaf Hall who runs the second-hand bookshop at the cemetery. His stepson, Bjørn Stranger, is the one who saves Jostein's life when he gets run over.

We become acquainted with all these characters and more when we put our ears to the city's conch and listen to it. There are few – if any – who can conjure up a time and place in a way that makes it alive for us here and now like Lars Saabye Christensen.

Lars Saabye Christensen (b. 1953) has published a number of novels, poetry and short story collections since his literary debut in 1976 with *The Story of Gly* (Historien om Gly). His breakthrough came with *Beatles* (1984), one of the greatest literary sales successes in Norway that, over the years, new generations continue to hold close to their hearts.

Through epic works like *Beatles*, *The Half Brother* and *Magnet*, Saabye Christensen has created a universe that has become common property. With *Traces of the City*, he has written a breathtaking and magnificent start to what will be a new trilogy.

Lars Saabye Christensen received the Nordic Council Literature Prize for *The Half Brother* (Halvbroren) in 2001. The author has been published in 36 countries.

It is just before Advent. He receives a phone call from an unknown woman claiming that she is his cousin. There's never been much talk of the family on his mother's side. He has never known the name of his grandfather. Now he discovers new truths and relatives he never knew about, and with them difficult questions come up.

He lives with an inherited illness that has forced him into a wheelchair. Is the secrecy in the family connected to the chromosome abnormality he has inherited? Will what he has found out about his grandfather give him insight into his own life?

The White Bathhouse is a story of origins, shame, concealment and the costs of being honest.

Thorvald Steen (b. 1954) made his literary debut in 1983, and he has subsequently published a wide range of novels, plays, collections of poems, books of short stories, children's books and essays. He has distinguished himself as one of Norway's leading internationally-oriented writers. His Norwegian breakthrough came in 1992 with a cycle of poems, *Fire* and shortly afterwards he achieved international recognition with his series of inventive historical novels: *Don Carlos* (1993), *Giovanni* (1995), *Constantinople* (1999), *The Little Horse* (2002), *Camel Clouds* (2004) and *Lionheart* (2010). In 2006 Steen wrote the coming-of-age novel *The Weight of Snow Crystals*, which was followed in 2008 with the freestanding sequel *The Longest Leap*. The nameless main character of these two books also features in the critically acclaimed *Balance* (2012). He has been working on *The Invisible Library* for the last six years.

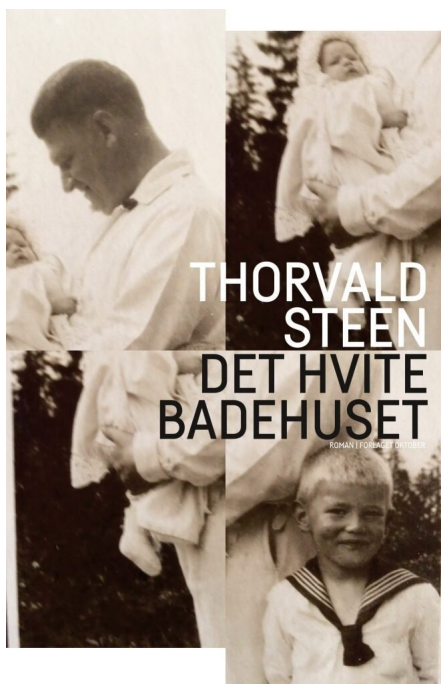

At one of the northernmost outposts of Norway, a scientist arrives to spend the winter in a deserted, old fisherman's cabin, working on a research project on birds and climate change.

Her toddler daughter she has left with her ex-husband in the south. All alone, surrounded by endless snow and the petulant forces of nature, she is eagerly awaiting her lover to come join her.

As the weeks pass, and her lover lingers, the remoteness she has sought starts to feel less like a refuge and more like a threat.

With plenty of time to think, she starts to imagine and reinvent the details of the tragedy she learns took place in the cabin generations ago. The rational thinker is drawn towards the irrational, her loneliness gives way for a disturbing presence, something dark and unknown, moving outside or inside herself.

Gøhril Gabrielsen (b 1961) grew up in Finnmark, the northernmost county in Norway, but currently lives in Oslo. She is an educated nurse and copywriter. Gabrielsen made her debut with the novel *Unspeakable Events* (2006) and has since then published three novels. *Dizzying opportunities, no fear* (2008), *Vermin* (2011) and *Yours, Always* (2015). She has been awarded Aschehougs debutant prize in 2008 and in 2010 she was awarded with the Tanum Womens writers prize. *Dizzying Opportunities* was published in English by Peirene Press under the title *The Looking-Glass Sisters* in 2015, and will be published by Tropo Editore in 2017.

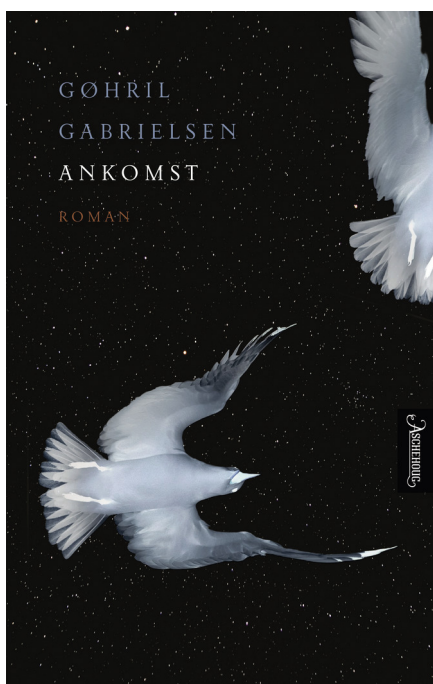

On a warm day in August 2008, Labor Party minister Arve Storefjeld and several members of his family, are found murdered in their family cabin at Blankwater, in the Nordmarka forest. Five people with their throats slit. Everyone thinks terrorists are behind the atrocity.

Journalist Ine Wang has felt out of touch lately. But the Storefjeld murders changes everything.

Judge Peter Malm lives a withdrawn life and attends his hobbies in happy solitude. The last thing he wants is attention drawn to himself because of a case.

Nicolai Berge was head over heels in love with Gry, Arve Storefjeld`s daughter, for years. Then she broke up with him. Now she is dead.

The most unlikely things happen in this world, again and again. Yet, we are never prepared for them. *Berge* is a story of horrible events, told from three different points of view. A journalist, a judge and an ex-boyfriend. Without touching upon the July 22nd attack in Norway, *Berge* is a novel that would not have been written without it.

Jan Kjærstad occupies a prominent place in contemporary Norwegian literature. He has a master's degree in theology from the University of Oslo, and he made his debut as a writer of fiction in 1980 with *Kloden dreier stille rundt*, a collection of short stories. He has written a number of novels and short stories and he has published picture books and essays. In 1984 he received the Norwegian Literary Critics Association's Prize for *Homo Falsus, or the Perfect Murder*. The fact that he was honored with Germany's prestigious Henrik Steffens Prize in 1998, awarded to Scandinavians who have significantly enriched Europe's artistic and intellectual life, also illustrates his international appeal as an author. His trilogy *The Seducer* (1993), *The Conquerer* (1996) and *The Inventor* (1999) makes a monumental contribution towards renewal of the art of novel writing in Scandinavia. In 2001, Jan Kjærstad won the Nordic Council's Prize for Literature for *The Conquerer*.

Back home she discovers that she is unwantedly pregnant. That should be an easily solved problem.

It's not.

I Refuse to Think is a dark, feministic contemporary comedy about politics, love – and an abyss that is getting dangerously closer.

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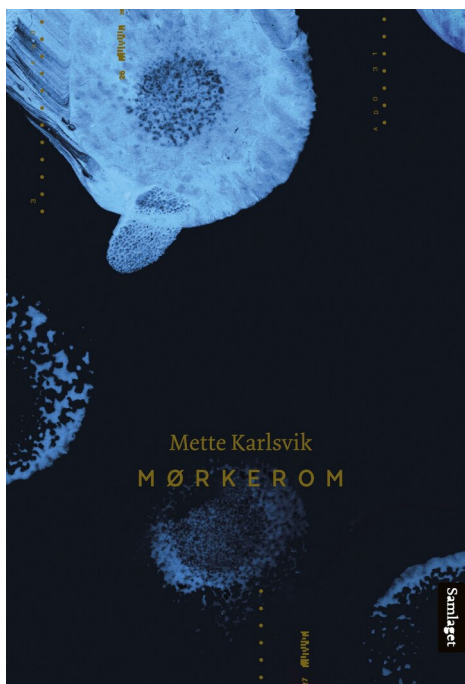

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Hence, another beginning. Hundred billions of cells split, rest, split again. It happens everywhere, all the time, when space bodies collide, when people meet, and in the darkroom, when split filters create a single print. These are elements that come together in the story of the darkroom; the story of a father, his daughter and their family. In the darkroom, they make images from film. Images from adolescence, about times changing a family and society. And all the time human beings are being created and born. People coming to life as cells split. People dying as cells split malevolently. *Darkroom* is a story about belonging and about losing and missing that one glance that used to see you, and that fixed you to a film.

Through photography and memories, "Mette" tries to reconstruct the life of her father. From beginning to the day he died. With him, dies the sympathetic eyes that made her proud of whom she was, and that reminded her of the good in life. May she find back to herself through telling the story?

Darkroom is a novel about being seen and learning to see. It thematises memory, identity and family relations. The language is suitably sensitive, moulding out a story about beloved ones as mirrors in which one sees oneself, and about making art from darkness.

"I have an album with photos of all I have loved. It is a catalogue of ways to love. No way resemble the other. No page in the album is empty, as no room in my heart feels empty. But then you start the fading out."

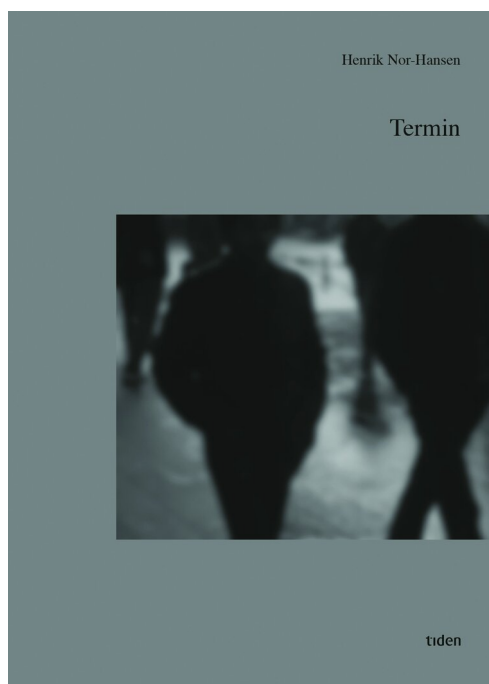

Midsummer 1998 a young man is found passed out at Hommersåk outside Stavanger on west coast of Norway. The police suspect blind violence. Witnesses are called for in the local area. The victim goes through a difficult rehabilitation with surgery and medical treatment. Half a year later the case is dismissed. In the years following the incident, Kjetil Tuestad attempts to find his way back to society, but experiences a series of neuropsychiatric after effects. Gradually, he loses the ability to be close to others, to intimacy, and is admitted to the psychiatric division at Stavanger University Hospital several times. He gets divorced and loses contact with his child.

During the same period of time, Hommersåk goes through big transformations, so does the region, if not the country on the whole. The money is flowing, but the social issues remain and take on new forms. To what degree is there a connection between the economical and psychological issues? Is Kjetil Tuestad a victim or a symptom?

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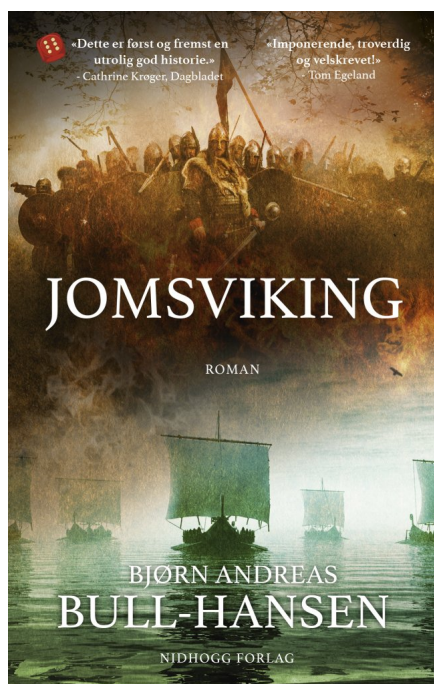

Year 993. During an attack east of Viken in Norway, Torstein's father is being brutally murdered by Olaf Trygvasson's men. 12-year-old Torstein is taken as a slave, but opportunity arises and he manages to flee. He sets course for the Orkney Islands, to escape – and in search of his elder brother.

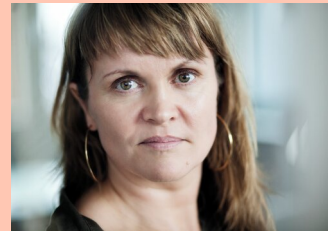

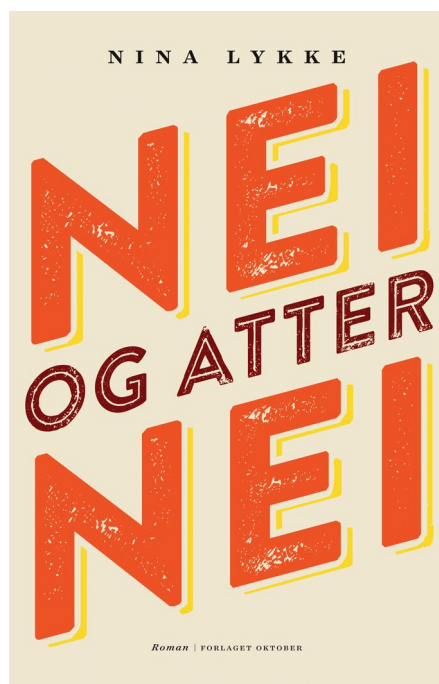

The Border places Erika Fatland at the forefront of international non-fiction prose. 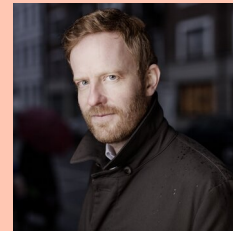

On two trips, in 2013 and 2016, both have been visiting all the regions of the country to document how life unfolds here, both during the invasion and present, after the Western forces resigned.

A warlord threatens to execute them. Another uses the bullets he has in his body as witness of his just struggle, his authority and his invincibility.

A chief of a militia explains how he keeps up with the government one day, then changes the next day to keep up with the rebels. We meet women activists who risk their lives for their cause, and we meet child soldiers talking about their fear of war and of death.

While the story traditionally told of doping in the international sports' arena has typically been a tale of an armed race between the evil dopers and the good champions of sports' ideals, Drange paints a significantly more complex picture. He depicts doping as an historical phenomenon that has changed over the past 70 years as a result of powerful politics, medical progress and a sports movement that has never been able to agree on what should be banned and why.

It is a spectacular and sad story where the victims primarily have been the sportsmen and -women. Either because they have pushed themselves to death due to a high consumption of amfetamin or fallen victims to kidney failure caused by abuse of steroids - or because they've spent years of their lives trying to become better athletes without ever having been able to beat their doped competitors.

This is also a story of the various doping drugs - how they came to be, how they have been used, and in what way they have affected the athletic accomplishments in different sports through the ages. Yet, above of all, this is a book that tries to find an answer to the question of why the athletic community, in spite of its attempt to fight doping for more than 50 years, comes up short time and time again.

Early one summer's day of 1944 John Maynard Keynes, together with a small group of economists, set sail across the Atlantic. Their wish was to create a better world. It was just 10 days after the D-Day landings in Normandy. In their wake, London was getting over the first attack performed with the V1 – the flying bomb – Hitler's new super weapon. Under the deck of the ship, 2000 German prisoners of war from the landing at Normandy were kept. 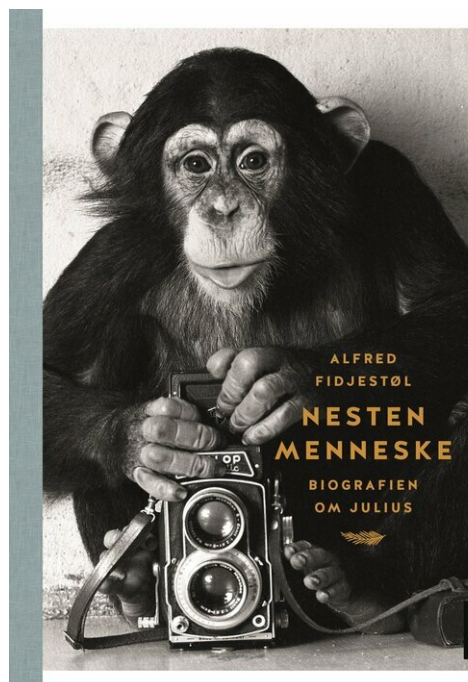

Julius the Chimpanzee is the most famous animal in Norway. He was born on Boxing Day 1979, in Kristiansand Zoo in southern Norway. Six weeks old he was rejected by his mother and had to live with a human family for one year. A camera crew followed him during this period and the following TV program made him into a celebrity in Norway. The humans tried to raise him as a regular chimp and in due course he was returned to his own tribe. But he was frequently brought back to the humans and for a long while he was homeless in both worlds. Julius escaped several times from the chimp island in the Zoo. He became dangerous and vicious, attacking humans, which eventually forced them to isolate him in a cage. Only after twenty-five turbulent years his carers managed to make him the leader of the tribe in 2005. Today, Julius lives as a content alpha chimpanzee and father of two within a community of nine chimpanzees. This book tells the remarkable history about this unique chimpanzee life.

Using international research on chimpanzees, the author attempts to find out and understand what goes on in the head of chimpanzees like Julius. The Chimpanzees are intelligent and social animals, they can learn sign language, they can collaborate and plan the future, they can be empathetic and self-sacrificing, and at the same time brutal and completely merciless. The book is a biography for adult readers, with the same methodology and documentation requirements expected from a modern biography, but with this tiny exception from the modern standard biography: that the subject of the biography is not and never has been human - only just.

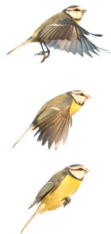

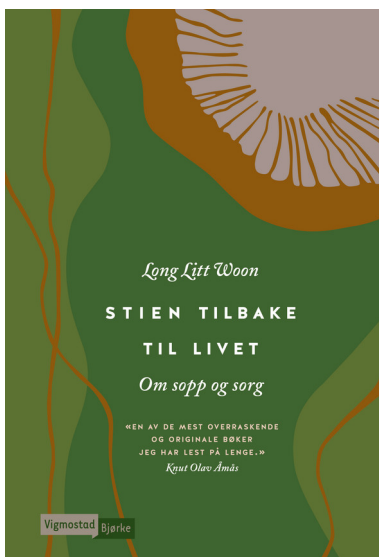

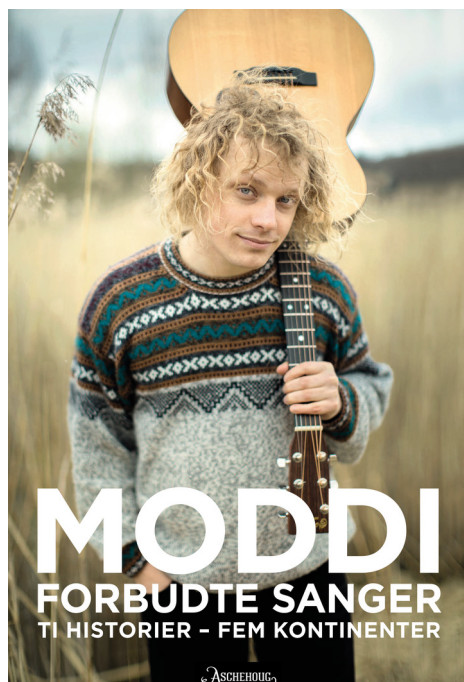

How can it be that in Norway, Los Angeles feels much closer than, say, Helsinki, a city situated in our neighbourhood?

In 2002 Tor Eystein Øverås made a journey around the Baltic Sea, through all nine countries that border the sea. He started out in his hometown Bodø, and travelled for eight months. Øverås wanted to map his world. Tor Eystein Øverås follows literary traces in the landscape, and traces of film and art. He visits places writers lived, places that are settings for literary works, and reflects on literature and landscape, literature and its sense of time and place, literature as collective memory, and the relationship between literature and nationality.

So much concerning literature is based on the concept of a national literature. Øverås wanted to cross borders in the Baltic region, and look for literary connections that transgresses national borders. He aims to connect the national literatures around the Baltic Sea, make them into a whole, a new literature.

This book was first published in 2005 by Gyldendal with the title *Til*. The new edition in 2017 called *Baltic. A literary journey* is a radically shortened text (70 000 words).

Tor Eystein Øverås is an intellectual nomad, highly respected among authors, critics and readers for his wonderful prose and essays and for his distinguished position as a leading critic of film and literature. In 2010 he won the prize as Norway's best literary reviewer for his book *Livet! Litteraturen!* ("The life! The literature!") Øverås' debut novel, *Titteløs* ("Without title"), was published in 1993. In 2000 he left Norway and has lived the life of an intellectual nomad for the past ten years. He wakes up in the hospital the day after with a strange symbol tattooed on his chest. Who could have branded him like this, and why? The clues point Erik towards the computer game Reborn, and before he knows it, he's pulled deeper into the game than anyone would have thought possible.

Branded is a tense, action packed story for both teens and adults, where cold, hard sci-fi meets Norse mythology in a fantasy novel outside the norm.

Asbjørn Rydland appeared on the Norwegian literary scene in 2010 with the fantasy novel *The Dragon Boy*, the first of a critically acclaimed series of five. He was awarded both Fabelprisen and Nynorsk Barnelitteraturpris for the series, and his debut book was listed among the best loved Norwegian books for youth/children from 2005 to 2015.

Throughout his career so far, he's been praised for suspenseful and evocative writing, strong, flawed and compelling characters, and the quality of his prose.

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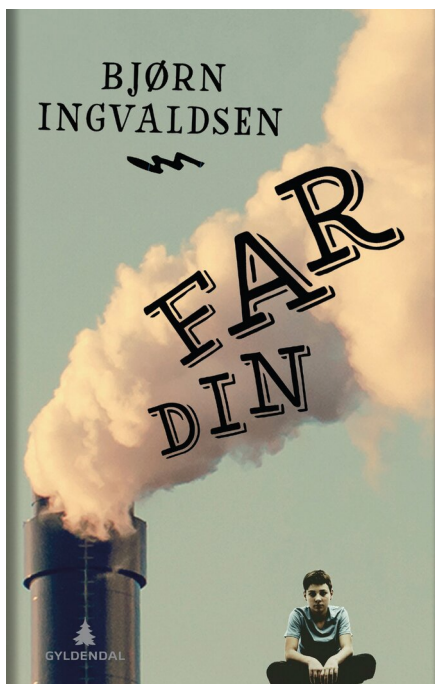
