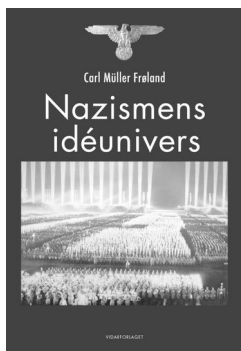
Nowherelands. Lost Countries of the 19th and 20th Century (Landene som forsvant. 1840 – 1970)

Besides stamps, the book is based on eyewitness accounts, as well as later historical analyses. Each vanished country is presented with detailed maps and stamps.

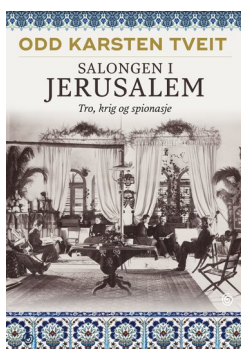
Nazism's Idea Universe (Nazismens idéunivers)

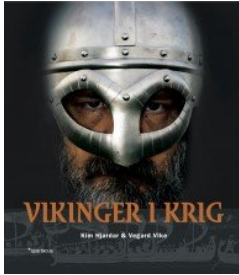

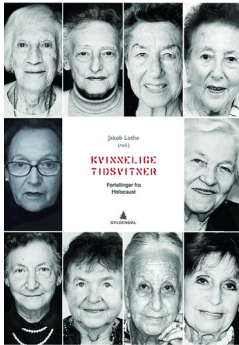
Vikings At War (Vikinger i krig)

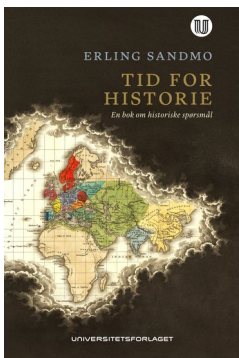
Female Time Witnesses. Stories From the Holocaust (Kvinnelige tidsvitner. Fortellinger fra Holocaust)
