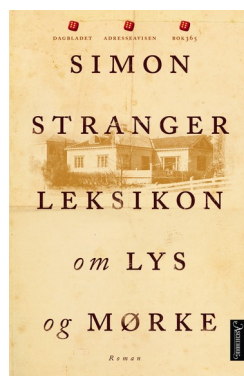

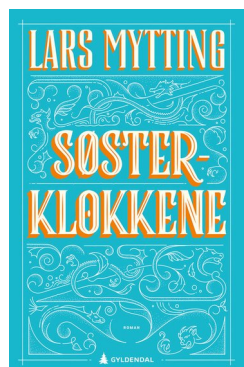

Built in 1170, the old stave church of Butangen is one of the few remaining examples of early Christianisation, unique in its architecture including effigies of pagan deities carved into the wooden walls. Even the bells – two sister bells moulded in the 16th century in memory of the Siamese twins Halfrid and Gunhild Hekne – are special. There is the legend that they ring of their own record when danger is immanent.
