She has always been able to rely on her childhood fantasies to help her cope, but now they change form and become more unpredictable. They no longer lead her away from, but straight into the pain, and things start to crack.

Margaret, Are You Grieving is an honest and fearless portrait of a young woman who is drawn towards life and death simultaneously. The book won the Riksmål Prize, an award given to a literary work with outstanding prose.



Kristin has turned 87, and there is no time left to feel ashamed, and no time left to hesitate either. When her husband of more than 60 years finally dies, she must find the child she gave up for adoption. In order to track down the little boy she gave birth to when she was only 16, she has to reveal what she has never shared with anyone. Why did she have to give up the child? And how has it shaped her life?

On the cribs in the maternity wards until well into the 1970s, a V for 'viv' (wife) was written if the mother was a married woman. If the mother was unmarried, an S for 'Spuria' was written, a latin word meaning false or illegitimate. Mother and child were marked from the very beginning.



The spring evening is surprisingly warm. Her friends arrive, clink glasses of bubbly and smoke on the terrace. The evening is heating up.




It is because of Remi that Selna hasn't left her shitty flat in months, after having been accused of plagiarism in an article that was supposed to be her big break. She's at rock bottom, without a job, without a boyfriend, without a future. All she has is her cat, Boris.

For many years, RT Remi ran an exclusive literary club in Oslo known as The Cave. There, in a back room, he allegedly drugged and raped five women. Despite protesting his innocence, Remi was convicted of the crimes and sentenced to prison before he appealed and was acquitted of all charges.

And now, he's dead.

Selna is contacted by the legendary editor Beatrice James with an offer: to write a true crime about Remi's life and death, and about the side of the culture industry that Remi belonged to - that allowed these crimes to happen, and which we, according to Beatrice, are still living in post-MeToo. But there is a tight deadline: according to Beatrice, Remi's unfinished memoir about the accusations, Victim, will be published posthumously by a competing publisher.

This is Selna's second chance, and her opportunity to have her revenge on Remi. But she will soon discover that RT Remi wasn't who he purported to be. And perhaps Selna herself isn't so innocent, either.





Like It or Lump It is a book about the sudden upheaval and change a serious diagnosis can cause.

In the spring of 2023, mum-of-two Line Norman Hjorth was diagnosed with breast cancer. Barely six months later her mother – author Vigdis Hjorth – received the exact same diagnosis. In this book, where the narrative switches between mother and daughter, we follow the two women through their treatment as both patient and next of kin. Vigdis Hjorth (b. 1959) has over several decades been one of Norway's most important authors. She published her debut in 1983 in form of the children's book *Pelle-Ragnar and the Yellow Building*, for which she received the Norwegian Cultural Council's Debut Prize. Since then, she has had a prolific and award-winning authorship, writing for both children and adults. She has won several awards in Norway and has been nominated twice for the Nordic Council Literature Prize so far, for *Will and Testament* (2016) and *Is Mother Dead* (2020).

Hjorth writes existential books about human conditions and life choices, and throws a sharp gaze at current topics in the contemporary time. With novels such as Long Live the Post Horn! (2012) she has made her mark as a fearless political author. Her big breakthrough came in 2016 with Will and Testament, which became an instant favourite among literature critics as well as a huge sales success. In this novel Hjorth writes about complicated family relationships, about violation and liberation in close relationships, and the right to own one's own story. Will and Testament was nominated for the National Book Award and Millions Best Translated Book Award when it was published in the US and the UK in 2019. In 2022 Is Mother Dead came out in English, and it was longlisted for the 2023 International Booker Award. Hjorth's novels have been translated into more than 30 languages.

Line Norman Hjorth is an associate professor in general literature at the University of Bergen. She also holds a master's degree in film studies from the University of Copenhagen. She made her debut as an author in 2021 with the non-fiction book *Credibility in the courtroom*, and has cowritten books with her mother Vigdis Hjorth.

Sigri Sandberg has spent much of her adult life writing about nature and the great outdoors, across a range of genres and publications.

But she has been too cowardly.

She has suppressed the fact that forests are burning, that the sea is rising, that we are up to our elbows in a climate crisis. She has ignored the fact that she, too, is part of nature – distancing herself from her own fear. In this book, she declares herself guilty of being a coward.



Kathrin Pabst's ancestors were living in Pomerania when, in the winter months of 1945, the Red Army advanced and pushed millions of German civilians out of the areas that would now fall to Poland. Throughout a long year on the run, the greatgrandparents kept a diary describing the cold, hunger and disease, forced labor and systematic rape. But none of this was ever talked about in the family.

At the same time, their son, Kathrin's grandfather, was a Wehrmacht soldier in one of Hitler's elite troops. He too wrote a diary, but it does not mention acts of war in which he probably participated, and he never talked about them. Later in life, he would build a house with a bunker in the basement. Why would he do that? And how could he, who was so loving, fail to distance himself from Nazism and the crimes his own regiment must have committed?



"No, that's private," we tend to reply when faced with questions we prefer to avoid.

We don't read other people's diaries—certainly not openly. We are reluctant to enter other people's bedrooms. We often talk about "the sanctity of private life," where the private is something to be protected and preserved.

But what is considered private is not constant. Before industrialization, it was not uncommon for household members, including servants, to share a bed. For the housewife, the home was a workplace. And with the emergence of screens, the dynamic between the private and the public has once again changed: The world has entered our living rooms, and our living rooms have entered the world.

Through thirteen chapters on our private lives, Hilde Gunn Slottemo has written a new and different story about our recent history.

'A highlight of the book is the depiction of how the combination of active social democratic policies and commercial forces transforms the role of the housewife in the post-war era. Slottemo illustrates how state campaigns and advertising function as public mirrors of the private sphere. Schematically, one could say that women transitioned from being unpaid domestic workers to becoming consumers and wage earners in the public sphere. I am reminded of Annie Ernaux's novel The Years, a book that, on an even more microscopic level, portrays similar changes in France. The focus on women's central role in societal transformations is a strong feature of The History of Private Life.'



Astrid Løken (1911-2008) was one of our foremost researchers on bumblebees in Scandinavia. Her work provides an important starting point for investigating changes occurring in the bumblebee fauna today. Løken warned against reductions in the bumblebee population.

While she was doing her major at the Zoological Laboratory at the University of Oslo in 1940, Løken was recruited for resistance work, and eventually as an agent in the intelligence organization XU. She became part of the central leadership and throughout the war she lived a double life, constantly in danger of being exposed. The XU agents were bound by a vow of silence that applied for many years after the war, so their efforts were long unknown.





She made her literary debut in 1995 with a novel for adolescents, *Anna on Friday* and published her first novel for adults *Deep Red 315* in 2001. Honey Tongues was published to acclaim the following year: Bergens Tidende described it as a book which "tears apart the myth that all children are kind". Now a full time writer, she has a doctorate in applied linguistics, and continues to write on the subject in newspapers and journals.

The time she spent as an academic at the University of Oslo and other educational institutions provided her with a wealth of material upon which she drew to write Norway's first campus novel, *The Best Among Us* published in 2006. 
