
According to Jewish tradition everyone dies twice. The first time is when the heart stops beating, and the synapses in the brain shut down, like a city during a blackout. The second time is when the dead person's name is uttered, read or thought of for the last time, after fifty or hundred or four hundred years. Only then is the person really gone, erased from life on Earth.

A chilling and gripping double portrait of a young man who became a torturist and a family that would have been an entirely different one had Norway not been invaded in 1940.

What turns the bashful shoemaker's son Henry Rinnan from Trøndelag into one of the most hated criminals in Norwegian history; a double agent killing Norwegians for the Nazis? And why would a Jewish family want to move into Rinnan's headquarters shortly after the war, in the house that for many became the very symbol of the atrocities committed during the German occupation?

Spanning over four generations, Simon Stranger skillfully constructs a story consisting of the most beautiful and painful elements of human life in this epic and ambitious novel, pieces that when put together also becomes the history of his own family.

Monika is 13 years old and knows that all her experiences will soon belong to a time past. She's 27, and an older professor's mistress. She's 37 years old and lives with Geir, they've just had Maiken, who rhythmically sucks upon her passifier, a strip of bare skin at the back of her head. She's 46, with a shedful of quarrelsome chickens, thinking to herself that life is a series of failed attempts at fusing things together. She's 52, and in the mirror above the fruit and vegs in the grocery store, she sees her mother's face.

Conscience is a novel of the restless yearning after a life filled with passion, purpose and a sense of belonging – but also about the sense that everything slips, that nothing can be held in place, that perhaps people neither wish to nor can bear the thought of actually belonging to someone.

Trude Marstein (b. 1973) was awarded the Critics' Prize as well as the PO Enquist Prize for *Doing Good* (2006), which confirmed her prominent position among younger Norwegian authors.

She received the Tarjei Vesaas' Debutant Prize for *Strong Hunger, Sudden Nausea* (1998) and has written several novels as well as a book for children and a number of essays.

Marstein's precise observation and unpretentious narrative voice are particular qualities in her already established oeuvre. In *Doing Good* (2006) this fully comes into its own. The setting is a very hot (night and day) weekend in July in an inland town in Norway with the Riverside Hotel and a 50th anniversary party as a connecting element. From this point 118 destinies are whirled out.

In 2009 followed *Nothing to Regret*, and in 2012 *Home to Me*.



This is the second part of the Echoes of the City-trilogy. In this book Maj – and not least her struggle to bring up her children, Signe and Jesper – is in focus. Jesper and his best friend, Jostein the butcher's son, grow from children into young men in each their own way.

From the book:

Maj hurries once she gets closer – she doesn't have enough clothes on and she's freezing. The moon over Fagerborg is shining. The light is pouring out of it. It's half past nine. She stops and listens in the stairwell. It's quiet. That's good. She lets herself in. Jesper is sitting at his small desk in the hall leafing through the same sheet music. He barely notices his mother. It's amazing; he can hear the music just by looking at the notes, just like others see the main characters when reading a book. Stine is already asleep on the divan bed in the dining room. That's her room, the corner of the dining room. Jesper will sleep soon too. But Maj won't. The moon moves from window to window. Day breaks all the same. It's the bills. She has too much to think about. Will Jesper manage to learn the new piece by Norwegian Constitution Day? And why does Stine never bring any friends home? And will this Bjørn Strenger ever stop going back and forth? And now she has Margrethe to think about as well, in addition to the suit at Steen & Strøm, the laundering and time, of which she never has enough. It's these thoughts that keep her awake. And Maj keeps coming back to what she would really rather not think about: how she hasn't been with a man since Ewald. Will she live out the rest of her life this way?

Lars Saabye Christensen (b. 1953) has published a number of novels, poetry and short story collections since his literary debut in 1976 with *The Story of Gly* (Historien om Gly). 

A woman takes long walks along the beach with her dog. When she is not working banding birds at the Bird Station, she keeps mainly to herself.

A woman walks in a residential area pulling a wheeled suitcase behind her. Inside the suitcase is a dead cat.

A woman goes out to her mailbox to get a letter she has long been waiting for. A letter with the power to change her life.

Three stories woven together: "The Exile", "The Body" and "The State". In "The Exile" we meet a woman who has isolated herself in a tiny place by the seaside. She would rather not think about the events in her life before she came to this place. But her defence mechanism is breaking down. In "The Body" we meet a woman who experiences the rejection of an approval for adoption of a child from China. A child she has been waiting for — for four long years. In "The State" we meet the same woman, but yet she is different. A woman who is slipping into madness and begins to stalk her case worker. How far is she willing to go?

Brit Bildøen (b. 1962) is one of Norway's most beloved and well acclaimed authors.

Bildøen made her literary debut in 1991 with a collection of poetry *Pictures of men* (Bilde av menn). In 1998 she had her literary breakthrough with the novel *Twin fever* (Tvillingfeber). For this she was nominated to the Brage prize for best novel and awarded the Oslo prize and Nynorsk literary prize. For her third novel, *Landlocked* (Landfastlykke), 2001, she was awarded the Melsom Prize and Sigmund Skard-scholarship. Both *All there is* (Alt som er), 2004, and *My gentle self* (Mitt milde vesen), 2006, have been praised by the critics. Her latest novel, *Seven Days in August* was longlisted for Dublin International Lit. Awards, has been widely praised in Norway and won the prestigious P2 Listeners' Novel Prize 2014. Bildøen has translated several novels and children's books, and is also a children's books author herself.

Margot is in her late thirties when her life becomes undone. She enters a conflict with the performance-driven headmaster at the high school where she teaches, her husband leaves her for a younger woman, and due to her new found circumstances she is forced to relocate from the affluent neighbourhood in Oslo west to a remote part in the east. The area is filled with strange characters, from the alcoholics gathered around the forest bonfire to the veiled immigrant women, forcing Margot to recon with her own prejudices.

In the first floor apartment of Margot's apartment building lives Vera. She is old, sick, and unable to walk. Slowly Margot and Vera begin to develop a relationship, and are able to communicate across the differences. Vera reveals a troubling secret from long ago, with Margot being the sole confidant she feels forced to take action.

The Effect of Moonlight on the First Snow is a sharp and humorous novel about two women, and the precariousness of life.







Norwegian Book Award winning author Monica Isakstuen's new novel explores the protagonist's sudden, uncontrollable anger with the ones closest to her.

Rage is a story about two thinking, talking people who meet, fall in love, have twins and buy an old ramshackle house more or less before they know what hit them. Sitting topless and pinned to her sofa by a giant twin nursing pillow (or rather pillory), the protagonist wonders what is left of the person she introduced to her partner two years earlier. How do you love someone so that they really feel it? she asks herself. And am I the sum of my actions or my ideals?

Isakstuen's original prose moves unexpectedly, but organically, between extremely precise and brilliant insights and moments of the most banal self-deception in this dark, funny, urgent and timely novel.

You can't go home again, said Tom Wolfe. Sure you can, says Linn Strømsborg, but only for a little while.





In January 1921 the Norwegian explorer Roald Amundsen took over responsibility for a four-year-old girl from the Siberian Chukchi people. He named her Nita. Three months later he took charge of another girl from Chukotka—11-year-old Camilla Carpendale, daughter of a local trader. At this time Amundsen's fame as the conqueror of the South Pole spanned the globe.

Nita and Camilla were the closest Roald Amundsen ever came to establishing his own family. For almost three years, they lived together on journeys across the globe and in Amundsen's home outside of Oslo. Diaries, letters and newspaper reports tell of their strong mutual affection in these years. Nita and Camilla learned Norwegian, went to school and made friends. Then in 1924 Amundsen sent them back alone to an uncertain destiny in Siberia. They never saw Norway again.

In *Cape Heartstone*, Espen Ytreberg tells the full story of these three intertwined lives, and the forces that shaped, them for the first time. Through an attentive and original use of historical sources—written, filmed and photographed—Ytreberg reveals a unique story and places it in a broader context. *Cape Heartstone* is a thoughtful, tender and often surprising book about colonialism and globalisation, modernity and migration, family and prejudice, and ultimately about the abiding and fleeting sides of love.

Julius the Chimpanzee is the most famous animal in Norway. He was born on Boxing Day 1979, in Kristiansand Zoo in southern Norway. Six weeks old he was rejected by his mother and had to live with a human family for one year.

A camera crew followed him during this period and the following TV program made him into a celebrity in Norway. The humans tried to raise him as a regular chimp and in due course he was returned to his own tribe. But he was frequently brought back to the humans and for a long while he was homeless in both worlds. Julius escaped several times from the chimp island in the Zoo. He became dangerous and vicious, attacking humans, which eventually forced them to isolate him in a cage. Only after twenty-five turbulent years his carers managed to make him the leader of the tribe in 2005. Today, Julius lives as a content alpha chimpanzee and father of two within a community of nine chimpanzees. This book tells the remarkable history about this unique chimpanzee life.

Using international research on chimpanzees, the author attempts to find out and understand what goes on in the head of chimpanzees like Julius. The Chimpanzees are intelligent and social animals, they can learn sign language, they can collaborate and plan the future, they can be empathetic and self-sacrificing, and at the same time brutal and completely merciless. The book is a biography for adult readers, with the same methodology and documentation requirements expected from a modern biography, but with this tiny exception from the modern standard biography: that the subject of the biography is not and never has been human - only just.

In California, the minibus carrying herself and a group of young climate activists was nearly overtaken by the largest wildfire in the state's history. We meet young people in these exposed areas, experiencing their challenges through their eyes. 




